Watch Out There's Bugs About

Greenfingers, one of the leading garden waste recycling firms in New Zealand, is the proud sponsor of Butterfly Creek's Wetapunga Breeding Programme and the 'Bugs About' exhibit.

"Greenfingers are sponsoring the exhibit because we care about the environment and want to make these iconic Kiwi creatures accessible for all New Zealanders to see," said Mike Jones, Managing Director of Greenfingers. "Interestingly, the wetapunga is also one of New Zealand's earliest producers of compost!"

Butterfly Creek is home to the only captive rear and release wetapunga programme in the world, which was opened with fanfare by the Associate Minister for Conservation, Kate Wilkinson.

"The mighty wetapunga, Maori for 'god of ugly things' has been a key part of our eco-system for millennia. The wetapunga species is usually only found on Little Barrier Island and its numbers have been modest in recent years."

Greenfingers is helping widen the horizons

of our younger generations and enable them to understand and care about our living world. Greenfingers worked in partnership with Butterfly Creek and the Department of Conservation, to create a sustainable programme to breed wetapunga for translocation to Little Barrier and new habitats off Auckland's coastline

- Motuora Island and Tiritiri Matangi Island.

DoC granted Butterfly Creek the unique captive rear and release programme for the wetapunga

which is led by Paul Barrett, entomologist at Butterfly Creek, who oversees the country's only display of the mighty wetapunga.

"Since the Butterfly Creek Wetapunga Breeding Programme started, there have been numerous eggs hatched which have grown into healthy adults," said Barrett.

Greenfingers enjoys its strong community role and makes it easier for people to be green.

By enabling people to recycle their garden waste the company creates 30,000 tonnes


of compost each year. This is organic material that would otherwise go out with the rubbish and be dumped in landfill.

Partnering with South Waikato Achievement Trust

The South Waikato Achievement Trust enables people with disabilities to reach their full potential through training, employment skills, arts and crafts activities, community orientated programmes and residential services.

Working together with Greenfingers offers disabled people in the South Waikato area both life and work skills, and makes a major contribution to South Waikato.

Russell Ensor, General Manager of South Waikato Achievement Trust says, "The Trust in conjunction with Greenfingers is hoping to increase recycling volumes in the South Waikato so that the area becomes greener and cleaner".

All recycled waste is sold locally and in Asia for the production of new products.

Why Recycle?

Recycling makes a huge difference to our environment. It helps reduce carbon emissions because materials don't go to landfill. It also reduces the need to take more precious raw materials from our fragile environment and saves energy.

- Recycling a tonne of newspaper stops the release of approximately 2.5 tonnes of carbon dioxide into the world's atmosphere.
- Every tonne of recycled paper saves 13 trees and conserves 31,780 litres of water (that would have gone into the paper-making process).
- Recycling a glass jar saves enough energy to light a bulb for four hours.
- A tonne of plastic containers made with recycled plastic conserves about 7,200 kWh of electricity, the equivalent of seven months power for an average home.
- One recycled aluminum can save enough electricity to run a computer or a TV for three hours.

Greenfingers' Tips

Greenfingers is also a keen supporter of home composting and wormeries. They save fuel miles and machinery and are ideal for the environment.

Reduce your rubbish

The most effective way of minimising the amount of rubbish you send to landfill is to reduce it!

- Choose products with little or no packaging.
- Buy in bulk to reduce packaging.
- Buy products with reusable or recyclable packaging.

Re-Use

Another easy way of reducing your rubbish output is to think smarter about how you use and re-use the things within your home.

- Just say no thanks to plastic shopping bags which have had a proven negative effect on the environment, bird and sealife in New Zealand
- Always carry long-life re-useable bags when you go shopping. Keep them in your car for every occasion
- Buy re-usable, long-lasting, repairable products instead of cheaper disposable items
- Wash and retain your plastic containers for freezing leftovers or storing dry foods in the cupboard.
- Remember one man's rubbish is another man's treasure, so sell unwanted goods online or give them to charity - don't dump them at the tip!

Home Composting

Load a compost bin with a balanced mixture of 'brown' carbon rich material, like dried leaves, straw, and wood chips, and 'green' nitrogen materials like fresh grass clippings and kitchen scraps. Properly managed, it becomes soil improver in a month. Leave gaps in your stack or turn it, and keep it moist and warm.

Worms at Work

Wormeries use less space than compost and make good use of kitchen scraps. To create a wormery of your own you need a container with drainage holes drilled in the bottom. Fill two thirds with well-soaked shredded cardboard or paper. Add a half a kilo of redworms (*Eisenia foetida*) for every quarter of a kilo of waste. Load your container up slowly, and keep it moist and warm. Within weeks you will have a fabulous wormery.

Go Native!

Planting native plants or ground cover makes your garden a haven for New Zealand's wildlife and birds, such as Tui and Kereru. Remember it's easy to make your own mulch and compost which will greatly enrich the condition of your soil for your native plants. Also remember that rainwater keeps plants healthy and it can be easily collected from your roof in a plastic drum.

- For wet areas - Ferns, flax, hebe and five finger.
- For dry areas - Cabbage tree, rata, pohutakawa and Broadleaf.



Get Smart

The days of throwing out rubbish and not worrying about the environmental consequences are over. Not only does recycling and composting reduce landfill it reduces the effects of landfill - the release of the harmful gas carbon dioxide (CO₂).

You too can play your part and help our environment!

Separate your rubbish into organic and recycling to reduce the amount that goes into your council rubbish collection.

- Greenfingers makes it easier to be green. Every bit of the 30,000 tonnes of green waste we collect annually is turned into compost and returned to the land. To give you some idea of that 30,000 tonnes, it's about the same weight as 185 empty jumbo jets.
- Recycling is the way to a cleaner future. Wherever you live in the country most of your rubbish can be recycled and turned into new products and materials.
